Each NF must certify the qualification of each horse and rider and list the competitions which enabled horse and rider to qualify, according to the qualification procedure established for each star level as laid out in Art. 506. Please include the relevant article in the schedule.

1. Principles

- 1.1 A type/level of qualification gives the possibility to compete at the different types/levels of competitions.
- 1.2 A type/level of qualification can apply to horses, riders, or combinations of horse and rider. Such qualifications for horses and riders may be achieved separately except for Championships when at least one must be achieved as a combination.
- 1.3 Type of qualification refers to the format of the competition: CCI or CIC.
- 1.4 Level of qualification refers to the level and category of the competition: One Star (*), Two Star (**), Three Star (***), Four Star (****), and CCI, CCIO, CH.
- 1.5 **Deadlines for qualification:**
- for Championchips: 4 weeks prior to the first Dressage day of the event.
 - for CCIOs, CCI and CICs: 2 weeks prior to the first Dressage day of the event unless an earlier date is specified in the Schedule.
- 1.6 A specific type/level of qualification is reached by achieving a set number of qualifying results in listed competitions. The maximum period of time for obtaining those qualifying results is the current and 2 preceding calendar years.
- 1.7 **Qualification for a specific type/level of competition can be maintained** by achieving one qualifying result at that same type/level of competition (except for 4 star where the result can also be achieved at 3 star level). Qualification for CCI type of competition can also be maintained by achieving two results at CIC/CNC type of competitions. This qualifying result(s) will keep alive that qualification for 2 calendar years following the year in which they were achieved without need of any further qualification.

CIC* Laintal 2004

- 1.8 A specific type/level of qualification will automatically “drop down” a star level if conditions under point 6 are not met during the current and 2 preceding calendar years prior to the event and condition under point 7 has not been met or has expired (more than 2 calendar years have passed following the year in which the last qualifying result at that type/level has been achieved). The new level of qualification will last two more calendar years and eventually “drop down” again if during that period conditions under point 6 or 7 relevant to that type/level are not met and so on.
- 1.9 Championships require one or more qualifying results, achieved as a combination, in an International competition of the same type and star level (except for 4 star Championships where those results can also be achieved at 3 star level).
- 1.10 A qualifying result is achieved by completing a competition within minimum parameters of all round performance. As of 2002: not more than 75 penalty points in the dressage test (and not less than 50 % of Dressage good marks before 2002), not more than 20 penalties at obstacles on the Cross Country Test, not more than 90 seconds exceeding the optimum Cross Country time, not more than 16 penalties at obstacles from 2002 (and not more than 20 before 2002) on Show Jumping Test. A qualifying result can also be achieved by finishing within the top 25 % of the starters.
- 1.11 NFs are responsible for certifying that the horses and riders entered in international competitions comply with the relevant type/level of qualification.
- 1.12 All national competitions used for qualification procedure must be certified by their NF to be of a least equivalent standard of difficulty of the relevant international star level of competition.
- 1.13 Any horse or rider qualified to compete at one level is automatically also qualified to compete at a lower level.
- 1.14 When a qualifying result at a certain level is required (e.g. CCI*), a qualifying result at a higher level (e.g. CCI**) is also valid.

1.15 Exemption from Qualifying Standards

- Championships – no exemptions will be permitted.
 - CCI/O/CCI/CIC – under exceptional circumstances, the FEI may, with the agreement for the Organisations Committee of a CCI/O/CCI/CIC and the NF of the host country, waive the qualifying standard for a horse and rider, but only at the specific written request of the rider’s NF. Such a request must be accompanied by the reasons for the request and a detailed summary of both the horse and rider’s performance record, including all the horse’s competitions at national and international One Day Events and Three Day Events during the current and previous year. Such exemptions will be considered only for specific selection purposes for Championships/Games.
- 1.16 The Technical Delegate or his nominee shall check that all horses and riders starting at a CCI/O/CCI/CIC are properly certified as qualified by their NF or duly exempted in accordance with this article. For Senior Continental and World Championships, NFs must send to the FEI a Certificate of Capability including a record of results, proving that their competitor and horse are qualified according to the requirements by the date of the nominated entries.
- 1.17 With the approval of their own NF and the FEI, OCs of CCIs and CICs may impose additional qualifications for horses and/or riders, which must be published in the schedule for the event.

2. THE FOLLOWING TEXT MUST BE PUBLISHED IN VERBATIM IN ALL SCHEDULES
VETERINARY EXAMINATIONS, HORSE INSPECTIONS & PASSPORT CONTROLS

These will be carried out in accordance with the “Veterinary Regulations”, Art. 1011 & “Rules for Eventing” Art. 518.1 for CCIs and 518.2 for CICs

All horses participating in any level of International Eventing competition must be registered with the FEI.

Art. 511.2.2

Every horse entered for any competition at CCNs, CICs**/* or a foreign country, and all horses entered for CICs***, CCIs****/******, CCIOs, Championships, Regional and Olympic Games, whether at home or in foreign countries, must have an official FEI Passport, or a National Passport approved by the FEI, as a means of identification and to establish ownership.

Art. 511.2.3

Horses taking part in CCNs, CICs**/* in the country in which they are resident are not required to have such a passport as is mentioned Paragraph 2.2. All such horses must be properly registered and identifiable by diagram. Unless there is no national requirement for equine influenza vaccination in the host country and in the country of origin, all horses must have a valid vaccination certificate.

EQUINE INFLUENZA VACCINATION, VET. REGS. APPENDIX VI (except events taking place in NZL & AUS)

All horses and ponies for which an FEI Passport, or a National Passport approved by the FEI has been issued, must have the vaccination section endorsed by a veterinarian, stating that it has received two injections for primary vaccination against equine influenza, given no less than 21 days and no more than 92 days apart. In addition, a booster injection must be recorded as having been given within each succeeding 12 months, subsequent to the second injection of the primary vaccination. None of these injections must have been given within the preceding 7 days including the day of the competition or of entry into the competitions stables.

The above are the minimum requirements for influenza vaccination. Both primary and first and subsequent booster injections should be given according to the manufacturer’s instructions which will fall within the stipulation of the FEI ruling. In many cases booster injections are recommended by the manufacturers and by National Veterinary Authorities/Regulatory Authorities at intervals more frequent than 12 months.

SAMPLING PROCEDURE FOR PROHIBITED SUBSTANCES (Vet. Regs, Ch. V & VI and Annex III)

Regular sampling is carried out in CCI***/****, CCIOs, World Cup Qualifiers and Finals, Championships and Games, whereas at other CCIs sampling is recommended. In CCIs****/***, the number of horses tested is at the discretion of the Testing Veterinarian/Veterinary Delegate; however, a minimum of three is recommended (Vet. Regs. Art. 1017.4)

Special guidelines are applicable for events covered by the FEI Medication Control PROGRAMME (Groups I & II only).

MEDICATION CONTROL PROGRAMME (GROUP I & II ONLY)

The Organising Committees of FEI events within Groups I & II are advised to charge competitors the equivalent of CHF 12.50 per horse per event as a contribution towards the costs of the MCP programme.

4. MEDICAL CARD (Annex 8 of the “Rules for Eventing”)

OCs must draw attention of all competitors that they must carry readily accessible on themselves a medical card (see Annex I of this Check list) for the Cross-Country Test. Armbands must be checked by the OC upon arrival to the competition by the riders and checked by the Official Doctor and the Technical Delegate for accurate information.

5. INSURANCES

All owners and competitors are personally responsible for damage to third parties caused by themselves, their employers, their agents or their horses. They are therefore strongly advised to take out third-party insurance providing full coverage for participation in equestrian events at home and abroad, and to keep the policy up to date.

6. EVENT’S ORGANISATION (Art. 114 & 115)

The OC reserves the right to modify the schedule in order to clarify any matters or matters arising from an omission or due to unforeseen circumstances. All modifications made to the schedule must have the approval of the FEI Secretary General.

7. ENTRY RIGHT TO SHOWGROUNDS

The show grounds will be open to all owners, grooms, riders and accompanying persons.

8. STABLE

Security and stewarding at International events, see Annex II of this Check List.

XVI WELFARE OF THE HORSE

The following Code of Conducts was elaborated by the FEI for all people involved in the welfare of competing horses. The purpose is to ensure the health and welfare of horses participating under FEI Rules and Regulations and protecting the good image of the equestrian sport. To achieve the widest possible publicity it must be included in the **Schedules** and it is recommended that it also be included in the **Programmes** of all major international events.

CODE OF CONDUCT

1. In all equestrian sports the horse must be considered paramount.
2. The well being of the horse shall be above the demands of breeders, trainers, riders, owners, dealers, organisers, sponsors or officials.
3. All handling and veterinary treatment must ensure the health and welfare of the horse.
4. The highest standards of nutrition, health, sanitation and safety shall be encouraged and maintained at all times.
5. Adequate provision must be made for ventilation, feeding, watering and maintaining a healthy environment during transportation.
6. Emphasis should be placed on increasing education in training and equestrian practices and on promoting scientific studies in equine health.
7. In the interests of the horse, the fitness and competence of the rider shall be regarded as essential.
8. All riding and training methods must take account of the horse as a living entity and must not include technique considered by the FEI to be abusive.

9. National Federations should establish adequate controls in order that all persons and bodies under their jurisdiction respect the welfare of the horse.
10. The National and International Rules and Regulations in equestrian sport regarding the health and welfare of the horse must be adhered to not only during national and international events, but also in training. Competition Rules and Regulations shall be continually reviewed to ensure such welfare.

Final approval of this draft schedule by the FEI, in accordance with Art. 115.1, denotes only that the contents are conform to the FEI Statutes, General Regulations and Rules. By no mean does this entail implicit acceptance of any liability of the FEI for any damages to third parties caused by the Organising Committee and its officials, riders, owners, and their horses.

**Minimum requirements to ensure implementation of the
“Veterinary Regulation”, Art. 1005.2.5.2**

1. ACCESS TO STABLE AREA

For an optimal stable security, the stables must be completely enclosed within a suitably restrictive perimeter (stable area) which will act both as a deterrent to the admission of unauthorised persons and to the exit of horses. The area must be sufficiently large to allow horses to be evacuated from the stables in an emergency but still remain within the confines of the perimeter. However, several disciplines allow in specific situations a lower level of stable security (see discipline rules).

Whenever possible the stable area must include only stables; lorries, caravans, etc., should not be permitted within the area unless specifically needed as accommodation for horses and/or grooms.

Access to stables must be limited to those persons indicated in VRs Art. 1005.2.5.2. It is essential that the official issuing authorised access be a responsible person of seniority within the OC.

2. CONTROL of ACCESS

The stable area will be guarded by police, night and day. Only authorised persons may enter in the stable area.

A control system must operate at all entrance gates so that there is an efficient and reliable method of identifying those who enter and leave the stable area at any time.

Extra vigilance must be used in establishing the identity of persons and reason for entering the stables during the night.

3. STEWARDING OF STABLE AREA

At least one stable steward, directly responsible to the Chief Steward, must be present or readily available in the vicinity of the stable area 24 hours a day during the entire duration of the event. He may be assisted by deputies as required. The steward/deputies must regularly patrol the stable area, without establishing any predetermined pattern, to discourage any form of illegal practices or abuses to horses. Any misdemeanours must be reported immediately to the stable steward who must, in turn, report to the Chief Steward.

The duty of the stewards is therefore to safeguard the welfare of the horses and to prevent any form of illegal practices.

4. GROOMS

It is appreciated that grooms wish to remain with their horses during the night. Only grooms duly registered with the OC are permitted to do so.

The Person Responsible must ensure that his/her grooms, or any other authorised persons with access to his/her horses, are familiar with the security and stewarding procedures operating at the event attended.

5. MOVEMENT THROUGHOUT EVENT GROUNDS

Movement of horses between the stables, practice, grazing and main arena must be strictly controlled. The optimum layout for Jumping and Dressage disciplines is attached. It is appreciated that flexibility will be required depending on the requirements of other disciplines.

6. STEWARDING OF PRACTICE ARENA

The Chief Steward must ensure that all practice arenas are adequately stewarded all the time that they are officially open. He must also ensure that these arenas are subject to random control when they are officially closed.

7. GRAZING AREA

It is recommended that a grazing area be provided at all outdoor events, and that this be subject to random control. If available, horses must only be grazed or walked in hand within this area.

The Foreign Judge/TD at events will be specifically asked to check that the relevant requirements are met as reasonably as can be expected, depending on the discipline, and to indicate clearly any shortfalls, following which consideration may be given to altering the category of the event in future.
